

Beverley & Pocklington BRANCH MEWS November 2007

2007 does not seem to be a particularly good year so far. Homing is difficult because so many people are making money from their cats by not neutering their females and letting them have kittens. The kitten season was late starting and people were able to obtain $\pounds 40 - \pounds 50$ for a kitten, certainly not vaccinated and often not even treated for fleas and worms. A nice little earner ... One Friday evening there were over 50 cats and kittens offered for sale in the local paper!

An open afternoon at Sheila's on 12th August was well attended but resulted in very few homes and people are obviously doing the rounds, visiting all the local animal shelters. We have a big advantage thanks to Cats Protection that all our cats and kittens are vaccinated, our adult cats are neutered and micro-chipped and we pay for micro-chipping kittens at selected vets when they are neutered.

Fund raising has not been brilliant either - the weather has played a big part and people in general do not seem to have as much money to spend. The tombola at the Market Stall in Beverley in April raised £126.10, which was good as it is pure profit and reduced some of the huge number of prizes we had accumulated thanks to generous supporters. We tried Beverley's first Green Fair in May, attendance was reasonable but takings were poor, £121.39 and mainly due to one of our helpers starting her Christmas shopping early!

It did not stop raining at Giant Bradley Day at the end of May and our takings were $\pounds150.09$ compared with a record $\pounds435.08$ last year. It was disappointing for the organisers too because they had made such big effort to promote the event.

Town & Country Day at Bishop Burton College, usually a profitable day, did not take place due to construction work going on at the college.

This year due to a problem with bookings at the Lincolnshire Showground the Lincolnshire Cat Club Show was held at the Dome in Doncaster in July. Attendance was reasonable rather than good - whether people did not want to travel from Lincoln or whether it was not widely advertised in the Doncaster area may have been the cause. We took £192.00 which was disappointing from a tied audience of cat lovers.

The weather at the Driffield Show was better than forecast but attendance was down on previous years and again, people did not seem to be spending. We were located on one of the main paths to the exit and it was very noticeable how few people were carrying bags. We took \pounds 343.35 (\pounds 420.52 last year) and also had the promise of an outdoor home for two cats at stables at the end of August. The Bishop Wilton Show was another victim of the weather, the fields were waterlogged and the show had to be cancelled.

Our own pens suffered badly in the floods on 25th June. Sheila was on holiday and Brenda on cat feeding/pen cleaning duty rang to say the pens were flooding. The water rose rapidly, it was over the top of my wellingtons on the path and soon reached our newly refurbished kitchen.

Most cats had been sensible and moved to their cat cabins. However, the feral mum with her kittens were afloat in their plastic bed. When she and her kittens were first moved to Woodmansey the kittens were put in a heated bed but she ignored them for 24 hours before moving them down onto the concrete floor. We therefore took the heat pad out of the bed and placed the bed on the floor, which she accepted. Fortunately it was a rigid plastic bed and not a fabric bed and it floated well. Being brave I pulled up my hood, curled myself up to be as small as possible and lifted the bed and placed it on the shelf. Mother cat, who is extremely timid, jumped out and did the 'wall of death' around the top of the pen, before joining her kittens. The shelf in the largest pen is too high to reach but fortunately all our pens are equipped with tall scratching posts with big tops so that the cats can look out at the garden. Mother cat and five kittens were all huddled up together, surrounded by water. They were soon moved to another pen. The mother cat and a total of 10 kittens were booked at the vets for their first vaccination that afternoon and Norwood Vets kindly looked after all of them for a few days.

That evening the water was even higher. We had placed all the scratching posts on top of crates, tops of litter trays etc. to keep them out of the water but they were all submerged again. From Monday evening onwards it was shorts and plastic sandals, much more suitable than wellington boots full of water!

The water showed no sign of subsiding. The bins containing cat litter all tipped over, the fridge was full of water but fortunately we had put up a new shelf unit on Sunday so were able to pile lots onto that. The wheelie bins were floating the drive, the lawn was under about 3 feet of water, the neighbour's pond had overflowed - attempts to catch goldfish in a litter tray proved unsuccessful. Yorkshire Water admitted the main drain was blocked and promised to jet it out within 48 hours. Once this happened, the water went down quickly.

Sheila was due back at the weekend so a work party was organised for the Sunday morning (the weather forecast for Saturday was not good). It was amazing how much a good team of volunteers could achieve in a few hours. A kindly electrician, the husband of one of our helpers, provided his services for free and sorted out the electrics for the pens and kitchen (and also the garage door).

Best in Show Cat was Jordan, a beautiful 7 year old, blue long haired cat, owned by Joyce Baker of Aylesbury, near Grimsby. This was a wonderful achievement as Jordan was rescued as a starving kitten from a bad housing estate at 16 weeks and had not been fed, only milk from his mother. Jordan could not be neutered until he was 11 months old as it took that long for him to reach 5lbs in weight. Best in Show Kitten was a late entry, Pip owned by Debbie Dale of Hull.

The show raised much needed funds for the Branch with a busy stall, tombola, delicious refreshments and of course entry and door money. Our thanks to John and Caroline Shields of Norwood Vets for doing the vetting in and Doris Wilson, Chris Campion and Helen Shaw for the judging. All these people give up their valuable time for free to support



us.

Wizard is one of our special needs cats. He is 15 months old and possibly slightly brain damaged. He is a handsome grey tabby and spends a lot of time running round in circles. He is very playful but unfortunately can get carried away and nip. We would not recommend Wizard with small children.

We have many other cats and kittens ready for adoption. They have all been vet checked and vaccinated and treated for fleas and worms. Adult cats are neutered and microchipped and we will pay for kittens to be neutered at selected vets when they are neutered.

Our cats and kittens also have 6 weeks free Petplan insurance .

Holly, a friendly black and white cat homed by the Branch was unfortunately knocked down and suffered a badly fractured pelvis within six weeks of being rehomed. Thanks to Petplan she was able to be referred to a clinic in Birmingham for specialist treatment. The vet bill will probably be enormous!

Volunteering by Sheila Rees

I volunteered to help with Cat Protection about twenty years ago when the children were small and I worked part time. A unit was erected in my garden which consisted of three pens. It has been improved and added to since then and now I look after three units comprising eleven pens, one storage area and a precast garage equipped with sinks, hot water, fridge and storage. Here I store food, clean bedding and litter trays. I now work full time for a GP surgery and full time for Cats Protection so you will realise I have very little free time. I have volunteers who help with the pens when they can, which gives me a little more time for paper work and phone calls.

Many people think I must really miss the cats when they go to a new home and feel sad. In fact, the feelings I have are just the opposite. I do miss them for a short while when they go, but a new home, a happy cat and delighted new owners are the main reasons I carry on. The gap is soon filled again.



Towards Christmas we will be busy trying to settle the cats into new homes before the busy Christmas break. We have a stall on a local market and various Christmas fairs plus Beverley also has a big Christmas market. We have very good team of volunteers who organise our events. As well as Christmas goods we will be selling lots of new cat orientated items and novelties, perfect presents for cat loving friends.

I am often asked why I work for a cat charity, usually by people who don't like cats, but in reality it's not a cat on the end of the phone or knocking on my door. The cat on the doorstep in a

box didn't arrive there on its own. My biggest disappointment is for the people who ring for help and I can't give them anything but advice. Facilities and time being limited, I can only take in cats when I have the time and space to look after them properly.

For me being a volunteer is half of my life. The people and cats I meet make all the hard work worthwhile.
